MERIVALE QUILT SHOW

Merivale United Church is now famous for its quilt show. The display evokes awe for the talent of women who can take little pieces of material and create works of art, full of warmth and colour, with no two exactly alike.

Our 2005 biennial Quilt Show was once again a great success. The theme was *The Year of the Veteran*, and featured the War Bride Quilt made by Barb Vant'Slot. We were thrilled that Barb's mother, Mrs. Morin, and her friend, Mrs. Stewart, war brides themselves, were able to be with us to share their memories.

In keeping with the theme, Don Robertson, a veteran and a member of our congregation, officially opened the show and bazaar. He was flanked by two air cadets, Ryan and Matthew Hemsley, grandsons of Bob and Shirley Donegani, great grandsons of Bob and Alice Bell. Rev. Stewart Hewlett offered a prayer, and Joan

Peterkin accompanied the singing of *O Canada*. With the help of Carol Ann Meehan and CTV, we were able to attract a number of people, who saw a news bite of our colourful church on the 6 pm news.

In the sanctuary, there were over 100 quilts, some valued at \$1200, some more than 100 years old. That their owners allowed us to show them, truly amazes us. The display was augmented by five wedding dresses worn during the war years by family members of our congregation. We are grateful to everyone who allowed us to share their treasures in order to create such a kaleidoscope of colour.

Many people beyond our group of quilters helped us over the three days, setting up the show and taking it down again; husbands who scaled ladders were very much appreciated. With their help, in two years, perhaps, we'll find the energy to do it all again!

A few quilts were sold, but a Barbie Doll single size is still available. We have a few others ready to quilt, and a new outreach project to begin. We plan to make lap quilts, using a variety of textured fabrics with tactile additions, for the use and comfort of Alzheimer patients. The challenge is to line both sides of the tunnel with them as they are completed, then pass them on to the coordinator. Sharon Monkhouse, who visited our group and inspired us with her enthusiasm. CORNEA TRANSPLANT

Helen Wilson has a new cornea. The cornea is the clear, dome-shaped surface covering the front part of the eye. The main function of the cornea is to help focus light on the retina and to protect the iris and lens.

To have good, sharp vision, all of the structures of the eye must be in good working order. When the cornea becomes hazy or damaged by injury or disease, light no longer passes through it. The operation involves removing the damaged part of the cornea and replacing it with a clear cornea from a donor. Unlike some tissues and organs, the cornea doesn't necessarily have to be matched by age, sex, or tissue type, although in certain eye conditions a matched blood type is best.

About 8% of all blindness is related to the cornea, and cornea transplants are a cure with a success rate of over 90%.

The organs are flushed with a special preservation solution, packed in sterile containers and packed with ice to keep the temperature at 4 degrees centigrade. Different organs/tissues have different preservation times: kidney, 72 hours; liver, 10-12 hours; heart, 4-5 hours; pancreas, 6-8 hours; lung, 5 hours; heart/lung, 4 hours; corneas, 72 hours; skin and bone,

several years. Internal organs such as heart, liver, lungs, and kidneys must be removed as soon as possible after the pronouncement of brain death. Eyes, bone, and skin are recovered after the heart has stopped beating-usually within 12 to 24 hours, and these tissues do not require a ventilator.

After the cornea was harvested in Toronto, it was sent to Ottawa on a bus! Helen had the round piece of her cornea removed and replaced by the clear donor cornea. The new cornea is sewn in place. She will be using eye drops and ointments to help the cornea heal. It is usually possible to return to work after a week or two. In about a month, it's possible to resume most of one's pre-surgery routines. Because the cornea heals slowly, full improvement in vision may take a year or more.

In Ontario last year, over 1200 individuals had their sight restored by corneal transplants made possible by eye donations. There is at present a critical shortage - 59 surgeries have had to be cancelled due to lack of available tissue. Helen would like to remind you to sign your donor card and talk to your relatives about donation.

Only the cornea (clear, front part of the eye) is used for

corneal transplants. The sclera (white part) can sometimes be used for sightsaving surgery. The rest of the eye can be used for research to aid in future treatment of eve disease. If you donate you will still be able to have an open-casket funeral. No one will know there has been an eye donation. Very rarely, there may be a bit of swelling, but otherwise there should be no visible signs following donation.

Individuals with cancer can still donate their eyes, except for those with cancers such as leukemia, lymphoma or cancers / tumours of the eye itself. Even totally blind people can donate their eyes because there is no relationship between poor eyesight and eye donorship

A letter of appreciation is sent to the family. The actual identities of the donor and recipients are kept confidential under present laws. However, recipients and donor families can communicate with each other anonymously through the Eye Bank.
