


The Ascension Service: Rising to the Occasion

A festival in the Church year seems to fallen into disuse. That festival is Ascension Day. The proper color of this day is white– thus it is one of the high festivals of the Church year! Yet it remains a relative "unknown" in the Church year. Some churches abandon it altogether and combine it with their Pentecost service. I feel that this is unfortunate. Part of Ascension is the promise that Christ will go to prepare a place for us; Pentecost tells us that He keeps us in His grace through the Spirit until He returns to take us to heaven. I believe that the two ought to remain separate.

The observance of Ascension then begs the question: How do we observe the festival and how can people get excited about this festival? What can we do besides have a children's service (thus enticing the parents to also be present)? Perhaps several suggestions in the following paragraphs will be helpful.

When I vicared in Burlington, Wisconsin, we had a review of the Church year, beginning with the Advent season. Much like a Tenebrae service, Rev. Richard Weeks and I alternated reading the portions on Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, Ascension, Pentecost, and Trinity. The children from the Christian Day School presented musical selections and there was congregational participation. The response indicated that the service was edifying and a good review of the Church year and the life of our Savior here on earth. This last Spring, Mt. Olive in Mankato, Minnesota (Rev. Richard Newgard, ELS) presented the Evangelical Lutheran Synod anniversary children's slide show. While various slides of paintings relating to Synod history were displayed on the wall, the children presented recitations and musical selections. The service was well attended. Obviously a Synod anniversary does not happen very often, but maybe a congregation can have its special anniversary service on Ascension Day. What a great way to remember that, though Jesus ascended into heaven, He remains with His Church, blesses it, and preserves it! For more information I am sure that Rev. Newgard will be more than happy to share any details.
