For those who maintain their own web sites, or a web site for their congregation, please link Praise Today to your site! Praise Today will reciprocate if you so wish.



Rev. John Hildebrant (WELS, St. John's, Wetaskiwin, AB, Canada) wrote this hymn. There are definitely shades of Davidic torment for sin. There is also the strong, clear message of the Gospel in verse 4. As you read through, notice the wide array of Scriptural references used in the composition of this hymn. Rev. Hildebrant suggests plainsong melody "Adoro Te."

- Give me courage to confess, Lord, before your throne. For my silence and my shame crushed me to the bone. And your heavy hand has brought forth nothing but a groan. Ah, my sin has been against you and you alone.
- Give me your unfailing love; pardon by your grace; Wash away my guilt and sin; cleanse without a trace. Open wide your loving arms - this prodigal embrace. When I know not where to flee, you're my hiding place.

- 8. So help us, Christ, our Hope in loss; Thou hast redeemed us by Thy cross From endless death and misery; We praise, we bless, we worship Thee.



Call to Confession: Hebrews 4:13-14

On Sunday, September 27, 1998, the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel ran a special report about a man named George Bennett. Mr. Bennett was severely burned in a work accident, with third degree burns to over 70% of his body. Maimed and disfigured, he felt his fiance couldn't love him anymore, that he wasn't the same person. Not only did she continue to love him, she assisted in his recovery and rehabilitation. On October 11, 1997–two years after they originally planned to marry–George Bennett and Viviam Zimmermann became man and wife. Viviam selected the following text from Song of Solomon 8:6,7.

Responsive Reading for Mission Festivals

This responsive reading, employing the Great Commission in Matthew (Matt. 28:18-20) and the psalmist's anticipation of the Great Commission (Psalm 147:1-5) could be used for Mission Sundays. Acts 1:8 is also used.

- **M** Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me".
- C- Praise the LORD. How good it is to sing praises to our God, how pleasant and fitting to praise him!
- M- "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."
- C- The LORD builds up Jerusalem; he gathers the exiles of Israel. He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds.

- M- "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,"
- C- He determines the number of the stars and calls them each by name.
- M– "and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."
- C- Great is our Lord and mighty in power; his understanding has no limit.

It's probably not "original" to set The Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-10 NIV) into a responsive reading. I have included them here as a reminder not to forget that they exist. This is set up for Minister/Congregation reading. They can easily be done with Men/Women or alternate sides of the congregation (Left side/Right side). Another possibility is the Chant version, chanted to a psalm tune as found in Christian Worship.



Two children with good voices can sing the David and Goliath solos. So here are the lyrics; imagine the background music as you read it, the music has a fairly strong beat reminiscent of war drums.
