Successes

In our co-op, we had a student diagnosed with ADHD and learning disabilities. His mother had been murdered by drug dealers and his father had abandoned him. His great aunt knew he needed help but she did not have legal custody of him. We helped her work through the system, made sure he received Medicaid and SSI. He was then able to enter residential treatment to deal with his emotional problems.

What I learned: Special Education Directors have the power to change students' lives through their dedication to the job at hand and the goals of the school system.

Mistakes

Our psychological examiner worked in our cooperative once a week, testing students, completing the reports within ten days. As time went by, he became somewhat lax with the reports and had trouble making it to school with enough time to test all of the students. Rather than try to be more directive and supportive, I watched and criticized almost everything he did. We had rounds of meetings with superintendents and a growing personnel file. It was a battle. Eventually, we worked things out and he still works with the cooperative. We grew to respect each other more, but it was a long hard fight.

What I learned: I wish I had been more directive and supportive in the first place. That way, the psychological examiner would have known that we were on the same team, not personal adversaries. He could have grown and I could have grown, without finger pointing and anger. If I had it to do over again, I would have had a more personal touch and let him know that the difficulties he was facing could and would be overcome.
