PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE - *Regina Woltmann*

Our last meeting, the Annual Potluck Picnic, was held the end of June at the Firemen's Grounds, and it seemed only appropriate that we be entertained by a group of firemen! The Connecticut Cellar Savers are a group of firemen from all over Connecticut who save old fire memorabilia, including fire trucks. They will be opening a Fire Museum on Main Street in Portland, just a short drive from the Ruth Callander Museum of Portland History.

Through the summer, many of our group have been busy, particularly our Exhibits Committee and docents who have held successful, well attended "Open Houses" on the first Sunday of each month. In addition, we've had several Museum openings by appointment during this period. Our display on Portland's military history has now been joined by a "back-to-school" exhibit featuring pictures of all the old Portland schools, many class pictures dating back to the early twentieth century, and a timeline depicting the development of the regional schools to the integrated school system. We hope you'll all have the opportunity to stop by and view this exhibit before it is replaced with our holiday exhibit featuring old dollhouses and trains.

Many of our visitors add items and information to our collection. Others have asked if we could be open more often - more than once per month - a request we would certainly be glad to accommodate if we had more volunteers to serve as docents. Please let us know if you would be willing to help out in this area!

Society Board member, Bob McDougall, has completed a pictorial history of Portland which has gone to press and should be available in time for holiday gift-giving. He is also putting the finishing touches to the 2005 Heritage Calendar which will debut at the Portland Fair.

Sue Anderson, of our Ways & Means Committee, continues her work on historic Portland magnets, which have been a big seller. Sue is also creating a coloring book of Portland's history. We've also been involved in other town events in a community outreach effort. Sue Anderson and I participated in the Trinity Church fair a few months ago and also at the Farmer's Market on the Town Green. We met a number of wonderful people and got lots of ideas for future programs, in addition to selling some of our products. 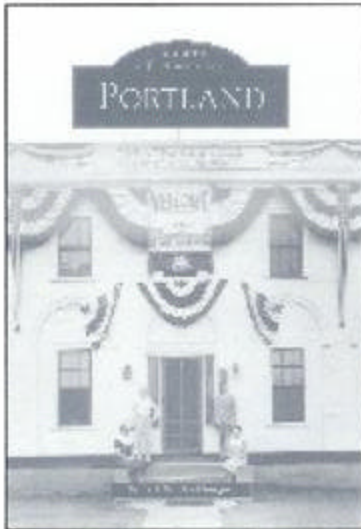

New Book on Portland!

PORTLAND. Images of America by our own Bob McDougall will be released by Arcadia Publishing this fall. The 128 page book includes over 200 photographs of Portland. Subjects include: Parades and Celebrations; Floods and Hurricanes; Landmarks; Transportation; Individuals and Organizations, and of course, Shipyards and Quarries. It primarily features photographs from the collection of the Ruth Callander House Museum of Portland History and also some photos from private collections. A highlight is a never before published sequence of 4 photos taken while the Brownstone Quarry was flooding in 1936. Construction photos of both highway bridges across the Connecticut River are shown. The book will be available this fall for \$20.00 from the Portland Historical Society, with proceeds to benefit our projects.

PROGRAMS: We have had a number of talented members and townspeople who provided informative programs highlighting Portland's history during the past year. We continue with Portland-themed programs this year. Scheduled are:

- September 28 -** ***“Portland’s Tobacco Industry”***— Speaker will be Don Goodrich, Society and Finance Board Member, with an overview of his family’s experience.

- November 9 -** **Hemlock Grange - Annual Meeting and Potluck Supper will commence at 6 PM. The program will be an overview of the Society’s business for the year.**
- December 11 -** **Holiday Open-House at the Ruth Callander House Museum of Portland History featuring trains and doll houses - 10 AM to 4 PM**
