



Oscar Hedstrom

In addition, featured in our Spring Exhibit will be new pictures of **Oscar Hedstrom** the inventor of the **Indian Motorcycle** obtained by Sue Anderson working with Maggie Humbertson, head of the Library and Archives at the Connecticut Valley Historical Museum in Springfield, Massachusetts, where the Indian Motorcycle Factory was located. Hedstrom family photographs have also been made available from Lisa Martin, descendent of Oscar, and Charlie Bronson, a nephew of Oscar's daughter, Helen Hedstrom Carlson.

Hedstrom originally came to this area demonstrating his racing bicycles. In the early 1900's he purchased a farm on Lower William Street for his parents. Later after he married, he bought the large house at 533 Main Street and lived there until he died in 1960.




