In addition, the foundation of Communique Unify-ContentBus-is a software bus architecture that unites content in a virtual repository and furnishes critical services such as versioning of all data, indexing, full-text searching, access control, filtering, and encryption.

The company claims that its innovative approach will deliver measurable business advantages to the enterprise. "Total business unification is different because it removes the requirement of maintaining a dedicated data store for any content-it brings the information in existing systems together under the same robust management and publishing umbrella that completely separates publication from the underlying information," says Tom Kuhr, Day Software's vice president of marketing and product management.

And the company's CEO John Payne thinks his company's visionary developments will definitely find success in the enterprise marketplace, even if it is slightly ahead of the curve. "Communique Unify combines the best of enterprise content management, portals, active middleware, and business process automation in a 100 percent pure Java product that runs in any J2EE application server," he says. "Analysts at Gartner, Forrester, and Meta have predicted the convergence of these sectors beginning in 2003 and 2004. Communique Unify delivers the same functionality today, at a fraction of the cost and with reduced complexity. This space will continue to converge, providing great opportunities for Day's unique software bus architecture."
