

Now to my point: Earlier in this years hunting season, I found myself obsessing on the problem of not getting venison in the freezer, mostly due to lack of time to hunt. I finally broke my jinx one Saturday morning in November and by downing two deer about 8 seconds apart with a single shot 20 gauge slug gun. I'm not making apologies. I wanted venison in the freezer. Period!

The other aspect related to hunting that has commanded my attention, is the realization that my kids are growing up fast, actually too fast.. She got consistent 1.5 inch groups at 50 yards. Lindsey was ready! The following Saturday, I too her to a farm in Central Point where I had seen voluminous deer sign. I put her in a ground blind at 3:00 PM and

told her that either a buck would visit a scrape in front of her or that does would come to feed before dark. Since, I had not vet harvested a deer at that point in the season, I moved to my own ground blind 250 yards away to maximize my own chances.

At 4:30 PM, I heard Lindsey's gun go off. I just knew she had scored. I walked over to her, and asked about the shot. She said that she hadn't really been expecting to see deer and started whittling on a stick to pass the time. When she looked up, there were three deer standing in front of her. She raised her gun and the three deer filled the scope. She pulled the trigger, and the deer disappeared. I found no blood trail and surmise that she had a classic case of buck fever. In any event, she had a great afternoon. I now realize that I should have been sitting



Marbled Arrow Crests

First I apologize for the quality of some of these pictures. Since I'm in the middle of a move, it's difficult at best to accomplish the proper setup and shots.

Marbling an arrow can add a touch of ownership to your arrows just as cresting can identify one's work. The trick is knowing what colors blend to make other colors. E.g. white and black, expect gray; etc. Then let your creativity take over. I had been working on this for about two years before I finally got the process down. Also probably threw about 100 shafts cut into short lengths away.


Needed items

- You will need a tube long enough to dip the crest end of your arrow down into water. I recommend one with a mouth width of at least 2/12 to 3 inches.
- Testors Enamel Paint. (I cannot make this work with any other type paint, and I have tried them all.)
- Water
- Toothpick
- Arrow

Prepare your arrows by running them through your dip tube with a base color. I have typically used white for this process and do anywhere from 8 to 12 inches. Once this has completely dried, usually a day, mark the end, where the marble swirl should stop.

Fill the tube with very cold tape water. Set it in a place that will keep it straight. When the water has settled down, take the toothpick and place into the enamel color you wish to marble. Only get a drop of paint on the toothpick. Then gently place that drop on top of the water. Once it touches the water it'll spread out slightly. Then I place a second light drop on top of the first. Take the toothpick and begin to swirl the paint into many directions. (Depicted is a poor rendition, but the only thing I could make work today without my real tubes.)

Note: There are three bubble spots in the picture below. I would throw this out and start over again with a real setup.



Quickly take the arrow and hold straight up and down above the tube. Lower the arrow into the tube while spinning back and forth, or in complete circles until you hit your mark, then quickly pull the arrow back out of the water. Hold a moment to set and then lightly tap the unpainted area against your knee to shake off any water spots.



At this point, I empty the water tube, and refill it for a second arrow. I do this for each arrow. Never use the same paint, otherwise it'll cling to the whole shaft.

After a moment of drying I've actually rolled the arrow across a smooth paper towel. Not one with dimples as shown in the picture. This will remove the water without damaging the marble you've just completed.

Let the arrow dry for a day, then you are ready to complete any further cresting, and/or cap dips required. Once this has been completed, I run it through a full dip tube of Minwax PolyAcryl to seal all crests and the marbling. When fletching, I use the Bohning tape and so far haven't had any issues with the feathers peeling back off.





Most importantly, have fun. It can be time consuming, but something neat to do on one of those cold wintry days.
